

42ND ANNUAL AWARDS DINNER A SUCCESS

Inner-City Scholarship Fund hosted its 42nd Annual Awards Dinner on Tuesday, December 4, raising over \$1.3 million. Over four hundred guests attended the event, which was held for the first time at the Plaza Hotel. Funds raised at the Awards Dinner will help support Inner-City's mission to provide scholarship support for students at archdiocesan Catholic schools.

Honored at the event were Father Joseph M. McShane, President of Fordham University, who received the 2018 Inner-City Scholarship Fund Award, and Todd Maclin, CEO of Maclin Management Co. and former Vice President at JPMorgan Chase, who received the James B. Lee, Jr. LifeLink Award. NBC 4 New York's David Ushery served as Master of Ceremonies, and His Eminence, Timothy Michael Cardinal Dolan, offered the closing remarks.

The Inner-City Scholarship Fund Award was presented by Dr. Timothy J. McNiff, Superintendent of Schools for the Archdiocese of New York, who spoke about Father McShane's lifelong commitment to Catholic education and stressed the continuity between Inner-City's mission and Fordham's, pointing out that almost 5 percent of Inner-City supported seniors attend Fordham after graduating. In his remarks, Father McShane discussed the lessons he had learned during his many years working in Catholic colleges and universities and expressed his gratitude for the award and for all Inner-City has done for so many of Fordham's students, and for all of New York, over the years.

Izzy Lee, daughter of the LifeLink Award's namesake, Jimmy Lee, presented it to Todd Maclin. She took the opportunity to discuss

29TH ANNUAL ST. THOMAS MORE AWARD LUNCHEON BREAKS RECORDS

The 29th Annual St. Thomas More Award Luncheon was held on Wednesday, November 7, at Cipriani 42nd Street in Manhattan. Supporters of Inner-City Scholarship Fund raised almost \$650,000 at the event, hosted by Inner-City's Lawyers Committee. Stephen G. Rooney, partner at Mayer Brown LLP, received the St. Thomas More Award, and Lucy Fato, Executive Vice President and General Counsel at AIG, received the John P. Cooney, Jr. Award for Mentorship and Community Involvement. Rohana

Sosa, an Inner-City alumna, spoke at the event. She had previously been sponsored by Steve Rooney, and she said that his sponsorship allowed her to remain in Catholic school after the death of her father and helped her achieve more in school and in life. She is currently studying computer science at Pace University and is preparing for a job with IBM after graduation.

Lucy Fato was presented with the John P. Cooney, Jr. Award by John's widow, Jane, who spoke about his life

of service and commitment to others. Lucy told the story of her childhood, growing up with poor immigrant parents in the suburbs of Pittsburgh. Her life was changed by a teacher at her Catholic school, and she hoped to help pay it forward through her support of Inner-City.

John Kiernan, partner at Debevoise & Plimpton LLP and longtime friend of Steve Rooney, presented him with the St. Thomas More Award and discussed their past relationship and Steve's years of support for Inner-City. Steve spoke about how grateful he was to Inner-City and to his family, including his father, Frank, a longtime Inner-City supporter and trustee.

The event closed with remarks from Timothy Cardinal Dolan, thanking the Lawyers Committee, both honorees, and everyone in attendance for their generosity.



CATHOLIC SCHOOL TEST SCORES ON THE RISE

Faith-Based. Future-Focused.

Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of New York are proud to report their student scores on state exams have again grown significantly over the previous year in both Mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA). The strong increases continue a trend in which Catholic schools' test scores eclipse those of public schools in both New York City and New York State, along with those of most charter schools.

Recently released scores for 2018 from the New York State Education

Department (NYSED) for grades 3-8 show that 50 percent of students met or exceeded proficiency standards in math, and 55 percent in ELA, representing an increase of 7.1 and 6.3 percentage points in the respective disciplines.

"This fourth consecutive year of improved test scores, surpassing the gains of city and state schools, speaks volumes about our students', principals' and teachers' determination to succeed," said Dr. Timothy McNiff, Superintendent of Schools. "I am proud

of our schools' accomplishments and gratified to see their hard work translate into tangible success."

Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of New York have maintained this level of excellence through the support and leadership of Cardinal Dolan, in concert with the talented and dedicated principals and teachers. The schools fully intend to continue this success, making updates to their curricula and educational materials every year.

FAMILY FOUNDATIONS PROVIDE CRITICAL SUPPORT TO INNER-CITY

Christmas came early for the students and teachers at Catholic elementary schools in New York thanks to a generous \$2 million donation to Inner-City Scholarship Fund (Inner-City) from the John and Daria Barry Foundation. This donation—the largest single-year gift in the foundation's history—will support Inner-City's mission benefitting low-income students at Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of New York.

\$1.2 million will support capital improvements at the Sacred Heart of Jesus campus of the School of the Blessed Sacrament in Manhattan, with a focus on STEM education, including new, STEM-focused classrooms to be named in honor of the Barry family. \$100,000 will support academic coaching and professional development at Our Lady of Victory School in Mount Vernon, Guardian

Angel School in Manhattan, and a school to be named later, focused on blended learning, a new approach to technology in the classroom and group instruction. The remaining \$700,000 will provide scholarship support to Catholic school students, who will be designated as Barry Scholars.

"This is the largest single-year donation that our family has given to an organization since we opened the foundation," said Elizabeth Swanson. "Inner-City Scholarship Fund was one of the first organizations we wanted to support. They have helped so many children grow, and we want to elevate the program with this contribution."

In addition to this gift, Inner-City received another extremely generous donation, a \$1 million gift from the Martino Family Foundation, which will help provide scholarships to children in need across the Archdiocese.

The Martino Family Foundation has supported Inner-City Scholarship Fund for the past five years, becoming an indispensable source of opportunity for so many inner-city children.

Susan George, Executive Director of Inner-City Scholarship Fund, said, "The Barry Foundation and The Martino Family Foundation have given children the greatest gift of all, the gift of education. I am extremely grateful to them for making a difference in the lives of our students, our teachers and our Catholic schools."

OPPORTUNITIES AROUND FOR INNER-CITY STUDENTS

Inner-City Scholarship Fund recently interviewed Job Opportunities Program volunteers and Inner-City supporters Amber and Michael Tortorici regarding their history and experiences with the program:

How did you first become a supporter of Inner-City and the Job Opportunities Program?

Mike: I was introduced to the Job Opportunities Program when they put out a call for volunteers back in 2012. I was attracted to the program's goals and thought the concepts they were covering--which often don't get much attention in high school--were a practical approach to boosting the future professional prospects of these talented students. I introduced it to my future wife, Amber, in 2014, and we look forward to participating together every year. At first I did not know JOP was associated with Inner-City Scholarship Fund, but JOP gave me a firsthand appreciation for the vast contributions

Inner-City makes to students and communities throughout Manhattan and the Bronx.

What do you think the most beneficial part of the Job Opportunities Program is for the students?

Amber: The workshops offer different benefits for different students. Some students have great resumes but have difficulty discussing their experiences and skills in an interview. Others are natural interviewers but would have a hard time getting an interview without significantly revamping their resume. The Job Opportunities Program is a supportive place for students to sharpen their strengths and address areas that need improvement, which together build their confidence.

What do you, personally, find most rewarding?

Amber: Especially at the beginning of the program, it's very common

to see some students sell their skills and experiences unnecessarily short. It's very rewarding to help students identify and speak to areas that make them stand out in the workforce.

Do you have any advice for students who participate in the program?

Mike: Many students enter the program with the idea they should have their careers neatly mapped out, but the reality is many professional paths, including those of many of our volunteers, take unexpected twists and turns. We'd encourage participants to ask their volunteers to discuss their experiences in the workforce from beginning to present, including successes and failures. They should also ask what skills have been most valuable to professional growth and what characteristics they feel are most lacking in today's workforce.
