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CATHOLIC SCHOOLS LEAD THE WAY

Catholic schools reopened their doors to students in September 2020, and have never shut them again. School systems across the country continue to look at Catholic Schools in the Archdiocese of New York as the gold standard for safe, in-person learning during the pandemic. Thanks to the selflessness of our principals, teachers, families and donors, Inner-City supported schools have been blessed with a fruitful and healthy year.

Dear Friends,

As many of you know, we celebrated the 50th anniversary of Inner-City Scholarship Fund throughout this past year. It has been remarkable to look back and remember the people who have dedicated their time and treasure to change the lives of thousands of children for the better.

The centerpiece of this year-long celebration was our 50th Anniversary dinner, held on September 23. It was wonderful to gather together in recognition of the cause we all love so much. The event featured rousing student performances and beautiful testimonials from long-time patrons. I left feeling more confident than ever about about the future of Inner-City.

In addition to celebrating, we kept our usual operations underway this year. In the 2020–2021 school year, we distributed over 9,000 scholarships to students in Catholic schools across the Archdiocese of New York. As families continued to recover from the economic fallout resulting from the pandemic, scholarships were more necessary than ever for our students.

What's more, in the 2020-2021 school year, we continued to distribute additional emergency aid to students who were economically affected by COVID-19. Funds were distributed through the Cardinal Dolan COVID-19 Emergency Tuition Assistance Fund. This fund was active in the 2019-2020 and the 2020-2021 school years. In total, we

distributed \$3 million to fund 6,000 scholarship awards for students in need through the Cardinal COVID Fund.

This past year, Catholic schools exceeded their reputation for excellence, maintaining an in-person learning option while many schools in New York City remained fully remote. This option not only optimized student learning but was also essential for families, who often struggle to provide the child care necessary for remote learning.

As our 50th anniversary celebration comes to a close, I want to thank everyone, past and present, who has helped make Inner-City what it is today. This includes donors, trustees, teachers, principals, staff, and, perhaps most of all, the hardworking students and their devoted families. Because of all of you, the next 50 years is looking just as bright. ⁴

culminated with a 50th anniversary-themed dinner with over 200 guests at Wave Hill in the Bronx on September 23. Supporters of Inner-City Scholarship Fund raised \$2.5 million in honor of the 50th Anniversary Celebration. Funds from the evening help support Inner-City in its mission to provide tuition assistance for underprivileged students attending Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of New York.

Executive Director of Inner-City Scholarship Fund Susan George stated about the donors and supporters of Inner-City, "They've been so devoted to these kids during the pandemic, checking to help them with additional tuition.... We're blessed with the nicest group of people. Whether you're a donor at the \$500 level or the \$500,000 level, we just have the nicest people. Every time I hire someone new to work here, that's usually the first observation they make: 'Wow, people are so nice.'"

The event was emceed by Inner-City trustee and *CBS Sunday Morning* correspondent Mo Rocca. It honored three scholarship students for their poetry submissions about their Catholic school experiences to the Inner-City Scholarship Fund 50th Anniversary Poetry Contest. The first-place student winner, Elena Villa, a sophomore at Notre Dame High School, delivered her winning poem, "Windows," during the event and was awarded \$2,500 for college tuition.

Guests also enjoyed a special student performance from St. Francis of Assisi School in the Bronx. The young musicians

ST. THOMAS MORE AWARD LUNCHEON

The 32nd annual St. Thomas More Award Luncheon was held on Wednesday, October 27, at Cipriani 42nd Street in Manhattan, the first in-person gathering since 2019. Supporters of Inner-City Scholarship Fund raised nearly \$550,000 at the event.

The luncheon, hosted by Inner-City's Lawyers Committee, honored Thomas J. Reid, Chief Legal Officer at Comcast, and presented him with the St. Thomas More Award. Latrisha Desrosiers, Deputy General Counsel for the New York City Department of Youth and Community Development, was also recognized. She received the John P. Cooney, Jr., Award for Mentorship and Community Involvement.

Susan Salgado, an Inner-City senior at Notre Dame High School, also spoke at the event. She talked about the excellent and transformative education she

JOB OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAM

UPDATES

Since its start in 1983, Inner-City Scholarship Fund's *Job Opportunities Program* has placed over 2,100 students in entry-level positions at over 70 companies, including but not limited to law firms, hospitals, banks, and publishing companies.

Every year, the Job Opportunities Program gives high school juniors attending Inner-City Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of New York the opportunity to gain experience in a business setting through jobreadiness workshops and paid summer internships at many of New York's most prestigious companies and organizations. The program ensures that Inner-City students who participate are equipped with the knowledge and up-to-date skill sets they will need to enter a rapidly evolving workforce in the first stage of their career.

The last two years have been a challenge, but volunteers have persevered and translated internship programs to remote experiences. Unfortunately, many companies are unable to provide internships, so the biggest need now is new support. To get involved, workplaces can sponsor one to two internships this coming summer, and individuals can donate their time at six monthly volunteer workshops, giving Inner-City students the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in the job application process. Workshops include resume writing skills, interview preparation sessions, and alumni tracking projects.

THE INNER-CITY JUNIOR BOARD

Though New York City itself is in some ways the greatest classroom on Earth, an incredible number of inner-city students have never had the opportunity to venture beyond their own neighborhoods.

The Inner-City Junior Board — composed of young professionals and headed by an Executive Committee — provides hands-on support to inner-city Catholic school students in participating schools. Board members work in all industries and live throughout the tri-state area, but their common desire is to help the boys and girls of the inner-city by providing them



with enriching experiences that they may not have otherwise had the opportunity to attain.

With monthly trips to cultural landmarks, athletic programs, and community service projects, the effect Junior Board activities have on Catholic school students is incalculable. Junior Board events have included the 9/11 museum, ice skating at Bryant Park, basketball nights, karaoke, and more.

For this and the previous school year, the enrichment programs organized by the board have gone virtual. Students were able to virtually visit the San Diego Zoo as well as partake in dance and holiday parties.

In addition to working directly with students (either in person or online), the board also hosts events such as happy hours and fundraisers for members to learn more about one another and connect.
